



Engaging the public in science is rapidly advancing research and offers hope as we face complex challenges in a changing environment.

Schoodic Institute at Acadia National Park is a 501c3 nonprofit organization. We are particularly grateful to work in close partnership with the National Park Service and a wide range of other organizations.





2015 ANNUAL HIGHLIGHTS

Ecosystem Science:

Facilitating and Developing Research Activities

- Facilitated permits for 88 Acadia National Park research projects. This was the third straight year of setting new records for the amount of research activity in Acadia.
- Expanded fall migration monitoring, studying raptors, seabirds, and songbirds through our bird ecology program.
- Acquired a sophisticated sensor for continuous monitoring of ocean pH, temperature, and chemistry (which will be deployed in spring 2016).
- Collaborated to bring citizen science datasets together and create visualizations to aid researchers, educators, and resource managers.
- Hosted the 25th Annual North American Dendroecological Fieldweek with 60 researchers and students.
- Hosted an international conference of oceanographers that study dynamics of ocean currents.
- Began collaborating with other field stations to develop common approaches to science at the scale of the Gulf of Maine.











Citizen Science - Engaging the Public in Research

- Citizen Science projects hosted by Schoodic Institute in 2015 included SeaWatch at Schoodic Point, HawkWatch on Cadillac Mountain,
 morning bird migration monitoring at Frazer Point, and projects monitoring phenological (or seasonal timing) changes in the intertidal zone
 and in upland habitats.
- Facilitated Acadia's 13th annual BioBlitz: 55 participants collected over 1,000 specimens of 300* species of wasps, bees, and ants (*taxonomists are still completing identifications, the final species count is pending their results).
- Led teams of teen and adult science volunteers from EarthWatch over 42 days, advancing research on ocean acidification and phenology.
- Developed training videos for the Dragonfly Mercury project, now underway at 50 national parks, and developed an online training course for teams seeking to develop or improve citizen science programs.
- Helped launch the new international Citizen Science Association: 650 people from 23 countries attended its first conference.

Connecting Science, Conservation, and Resource Stewardship

- Hosted the Acadia National Park Science Symposium.
- Contributed to leadership of the Down East Research and Education Network and hosted its Convergence Conference.
- Hosted a three day climate change scenario planning workshop with Acadia National Park.
- Hosted a two-day conference of the Northeast Region Migration Monitoring Network.

Life-long Learning:

Reaching Students

- Partnered with Acadia to offer the three-day Schoodic Education Adventure to over 800 students. In 2015, 22 Maine schools participated, along with three out-of-state schools.
- Continued the Acadia Learning snowpack project, bringing science into classrooms and students into the outdoors, with students of 18 teachers from 13 Maine schools collecting snow data and investigating effects of climate change on snowpack, hydrology, and aquatic habitats.
- Hosted OceansWide Marine Science Camps and provided scholarships to local students.

Supporting Teachers and Advancing Education


- Led teacher professional development workshops and courses, including Advanced Placement Summer Institutes open to middle and high school teachers who teach advanced placement or pre-advanced placement courses, and partnered with Princeton University's QUEST program for science teachers.
- Completed five years of data collection on the Maine Physical Sciences Partnership aimed at improving grade 6-9 science teaching across Maine.
- Assisted individual school districts with curriculum development and to help teachers make more productive use of student assessment data as Maine schools transition to assessment of student proficiency relative to state learning standards.
- Began evaluating a program to improve science teaching in 1,000
 Pre-K 5 classrooms.
- Participated in the Environmental Living and Learning for Maine Students (ELLMS) collaborative, including hosting an educator summit.
 ELLMS was honored with an EPA Environmental Merit Award.

Life-long Learning

- Piloted the Schoodic Winter Festival and began planning the 2016 Acadia Winter Festival.
- Led 5 multi-day birding ecotours, with a citizen science component, in partnership with the Maine Birding Trail.
- Partnered to offer family activities such as spring Junior Ranger Day and International Migratory Bird Day, and fall Eek of Ecology.
- Invited guests on a benefit cruise sponsored by Bar Harbor Whale Watch.
- · Offered public seminars, discussions, and brown bag lunches by notable authors and experts.
- Hosted a variety of university courses, local and regional education programs, and nonprofit meetings, all contributing to an increase in activity on campus.
- Joined in celebrating the opening of the new Schoodic Woods trails and campground.

Inspiration Through Art

- Hosted 17 Acadia Artists-in-Residence.
- Hosted art exhibits, workshops, and retreats ranging from one-on-one instruction to a retreat for 100 plein air painters.

Schoodic Marine Center

In late 2015 Schoodic Institute created a new entity, Schoodic Marine Center, and secured a long-term lease of the Winter Harbor Marina. The goal is to keep the property available for access to and from the ocean for research, education, transportation, and other community uses. The Schoodic Marine Center planning process will involve seeking input and engagement from community members in 2016. Visitors in 2016 should see modest site improvements, a small exhibit area, two operating ferry services between Winter Harbor and Bar Harbor, increased Island Explorer bus services (Memorial Day to Columbus Day, on a 30 minute interval in the summer) and bike rentals available on site.
